

Our 6th URSULINE SPONSORED HOUSE in collaboration with the Sisters of the Sacred Heart, brought hope and joy to Miss Meka and her 13-year-old daughter. Her home was



partially destroyed by tornadoes in February 2018, just 13 years after flood damage from Katrina.

Because of COVID-19 we are unable to go out and rebuild, but keep in contact by phone with those we have helped, namely, Mr. Frank, Miss Nanie, Miss Meka, etc. Our phone encounters bring HOPE and ENCOURAGEMENT. In one case our Ursuline community provided food and then we contacted an agency who would provide daily meals for the family.

Serviam is still very much alive even though some projects have been postponed. The St. Louis

Ursuline students had to cancel March 14, the day before they were to come to New Orleans due to COVID-19, but rescheduled for August 3-6, 2020. We now have funds for our 7th house which we hope the students will have a hand on in August.

Our monthly day of service for all Alumnae will continue once the air is cleared.

As a sign of HOPE for our neighborhood we, (Sisters Ginger, Mary Ann, Maggie and Regina Marie) painted a rainbow on our driveway as a sign of HOPE for our neighborhood. Many have expressed gratitude for it brings JOY and HOPE.
