My climate change experience came to me during a Zoom course this spring. I was taking a certification course to become a Laudato Si' Animator which involved small international breakout rooms. We were given a starting point: to explain what drew us to take the course. No one was speaking. So, I began, running on and on about how much nature has always been part of my life, roaming the woods as a boy, the Ecology Club at school, my grandfather, Earth Day, and gardening. Then a man, about my age from Great Britain, chimed in about how he and his wife loved to drive in the English countryside on weekends. It meant so much to them - "Wonderful times." His comments paralleled my experiences. None of the others in the breakout room wanted to speak.

A woman's voice came from a dark box in the "room." It had no image. I heard wind blowing harshly. She must be outdoors. The voice told us she was joining us from Ghana. I cannot recall her exact words, but I remember the essence: "We **hate** nature here. It's too hot – our crops can't grow. The seeds come up and the plants die. We don't have enough water for them." It was hard to hear everything due to the stiff winds. "I am not here because of nature; nature is not good here. It's not nature, I AM HERE FOR **THE JUSTICE**. I am here for...." SNAP! The screen went blank. Our breakout session was over. That moment was a punch in the gut. Still is.

I am working with a woman who graduated from Duke University with a B.S. in Earth and Climate Sciences. In therapy, she shares her despair. No matter what the work she is doing, she understands full well that a larger more macro-level intervention is required among uncooperative nations. She and her partner are not certain that they can justify bringing a child into a climate crisis world and decided NOT to have children. How sad.

This concern is growing and has created a demand for a new therapeutic specialty. <u>Climate-Aware Therapist Directory</u> has been established.
